Despite some challenges, Cameron received the highest statewide degree in Future Farmers of America. He stated that he is very happy and proud of himself; because he not only succeeded, but he surpassed many classmates. Cameron took the same test as the honors students and made straight A's throughout his classes.

His mother, Renee Domina, said that Cameron was diagnosed with autism and an intellectual disability and that when he was three years old, they were told that he would only have around a 50-word vocabulary.

Cameron said that he loves animals and nature and would like to have a job on a farm caring for animals.

The four degrees you can receive in FFA are the Greenhand degree, Chapter degree, State degree and the American degree, with state and national degrees being the highest achievements in the organization.

Cameron was featured in The Dispatch, a Davidson County newsletter. Sharon Myers, columnist for the newsletter, stated the following: "To receive the State FFA degree, a student must have been an active FFA member for past two years, received the chapter FFA degree, completed 360 hours of school instruction in agricultural education, earned at least \$1,000 or worked at least 300 hours outside of school, demonstrated leadership, have a certified scholastic record, completed the chapter's program of activities, participated in at least five different FFA activities at the chapter level and at least 25 hours of community services."

We are very proud of Cameron and his accomplishments. He states that he doesn't think about what he can't do, but only thinks about what is ahead of him. We wish you continued success, Cameron, as you graduate this year!

SERVICES WE PROVIDE

TA'S 2019 PROGRESS REPORT

Therapeutic Alternatives, Inc. is far-reaching in its support services, and the Quality Improvement Committee members are always planning ways to bring various agency departments together. One way to spread the word about the kinds of services provided is through our *Empowering Times* newsletter. In this edition, we will present some information about our outreach.

OVERVIEW OF TA

Therapeutic Alternatives, Inc. is a human services agency that provides support to people with development disabilities, mental illness and/or substance abuse issues. The agency was founded in 1958 in Asheboro, North Carolina with the licensing of one assisted living community, Randolph Rest Home.

Presently, the agency is licensed or credentialed to administer services as follows:

Innovations (Individual Community Services)

NC Innovations Waiver Services is a list of services covered by the state of North Carolina. Innovations services are provided in individuals' private homes, on the job and throughout the community. The services are based on the person's Individualized Support Plan (ISP). Some of the services include Community Networking, Community Living and Supports, Respite and Supported Employment.

Presently, three service coordinators provide supervision of Innovations paraprofessional staff and oversight to the progress and needs of people supported. Paraprofessionals follow the individual goals of the people with whom they work. Goals are determined based upon each individual person's disabilities and his/her dreams and desires which are expressed through various methods such as surveys and personal outcome measures (POMs).

Therapeutic Alternatives, Inc. Innovations Services are currently provided throughout the counties of Davidson, Forsyth, Guilford, Montgomery, Randolph, Rowan, Surry, and Rockingham.

HOSPITAL TRANSITION TEAMS (HTT)

For those who work in departments other than Hospital Transitions Teams (HTT), we thought that we would include some information about the teams.

HTT provides short-term services designed to help people connect with services and benefits quickly after hospital discharge.

HTT is classified as Assertive Engagement and is a method of outreaching individuals who have a severe and/or serious mental illness and/or those who are dually diagnosed with a mental illness and substance use disorder.

HTT provides a short-term service, 30-45 days, and is designed to help people maintain psychiatric progress made in psychiatric hospitals or progress related to recovery made in residential substance abuse treatment programs, connect with services and benefits quickly after hospital discharge, and receive support once returning back into the community setting.

HTT specifically helps with assisting the hospital social worker with discharge planning, providing recommendations about residential placements including substance abuse residential treatment programs, ensuring linkage to an outpatient treatment provider for medication management, group/individual therapy, connecting with enhanced services such as: Assertive Community Treatment Team, Community Support Team, Intensive Outpatient Service, primary care, assisting with meeting basic needs, and providing education about your mental health and/or substance abuse issues, medications, and/or coping skills.

HTT operates under Sandhills MCO and serves the following counties: Guilford, Randolph, Montgomery, Anson, Richmond, Hoke, Moore, Lee, Harnett. Furthermore, Hospital Transition Team operates under Alliance MCO and serves the following Counties: Wake and Durham.

MOBILE CRISIS MANAGEMENT (MCM)

MCM is a mobile mental health emergency responder that provides services 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Our goal is to stabilize crisis situations, link the individual to appropriate services and prevent a future crisis.

MCM provides:

o Immediate telephonic response to assess the crisis and determine the risk, mental status, medical stability, and appropriateness.

o Face-to-face crisis response within two (2) hours to provide evaluation, triage and access for acute mental health, developmental disabilities, and/or substance abuse services, treatment, and supports.

o Engagement Referrals

MCM covers the following counties:

o Guilford, Randolph, Montgomery, Lee, Richmond, Hoke, Anson, Harnett, Moore — (MCO: Sandhills Center)

o Chatham County— (MCO: Cardinal Innovations)

o Wake, Durham, Johnston, Cumberland — (MCO: Alliance Health)

Last but not least among TA's services provided, we have the Geriatric and Adult Specialty Teams (GAST) which we will feature in a later edition.
